

Dear Naperville 203 Community:

As mentioned in last week's 203 in 2:03, the Illinois State Board of Education and Illinois Department of Public Health have updated their school guidance which allows Naperville 203 to increase the time our students spend in-person. Students at all levels will return to five-days a week in-person learning on April 7, 2021. Key Components of the Return to Full In-Person Instruction Include:

Selecting In-Person or Online Learning

All families will receive a separate email for each Naperville 203 student in your household on Tuesday, March 16. Please review the information contained in this email. If you are keeping your student in their current mode of learning <u>no action is required</u>. If you are making a change, please do so no later than <u>3:00 pm on Friday, March 19, 2021</u>. Please address any student-specific questions to your building principal.

Mitigation Efforts

- 6 feet of social distance continues to be the safest, and we will work to provide this distance to the greatest extent possible throughout the school day. When it cannot be maintained, we will analyze the space to determine how we can safely reduce the physical distance between students and fully vaccinated staff. When it has been determined to be necessary, we will cautiously reduce this distance, working our way backward from 6 feet to 3 feet. We will never plan for less than 3 feet of physical distance between students and fully vaccinated staff. However, there may be incidental, unplanned, and brief moments when students and vaccinated staff are less than 3 feet apart. We will work to minimize these occurrences at all times.
- Masks will be worn at all times other than during lunch and when outside and 6 feet of distance can be maintained. Elementary students will wear masks during recess.
- Continued contact tracing in combination with the isolation and quarantine as needed.
- Continued promotion and adherence to handwashing and respiratory etiquette.
- Surveillance screening 2x per week for students in grades 6-12.
- Staff vaccination rates increasing.

<u>School Day Hours</u> *Early Childhood and Elementary*



- Early childhood students attend ½ days Monday Friday 8:30-11:00 a.m. or 12:15-2:45 p.m.
- PFAE students at Scott and Maplebrook attend 8:30 a.m. 12:30 p.m. Monday Friday.
- Elementary students attend 8:15 a.m. 2:30 p.m. Monday Friday.
- Online learners continue to livestream five days a week following the in-person schedule.

Junior High

- Students attend 8:00 a.m. 2:50 p.m. Monday Friday.
- Online learners continue to livestream five days a week following the in-person schedule.

<u>High School</u>

- Students attend 7:35 a.m. 1:30 p.m. Monday Friday following 4-period block schedule (no lunch).
- High School specialized students attend 7:35 a.m. 3:10 p.m. Monday Friday.
- Connections students attend 8:30 a.m. 2:30 p.m. Monday Friday.
- Online learners continue to livestream five days a week following the in-person schedule.

<u>Lunch</u>

Early Childhood and Elementary

- Limited options of hot or cold (one option) available through Aramark food services. Students may also bring lunch to school.
- 6 feet social distancing strictly adhered to while students are eating which will require other spaces to be used for lunch beyond the lunchroom (e.g. classroom).

Junior High

- Limited options of hot or cold (one option) only.
- 6 feet social distancing strictly adhered to while students are eating which will require other spaces to be used for lunch beyond the lunchroom (e.g. MPR, gym, classroom).

High School

• No traditional lunch will be served but we will continue to offer grab-and-go food service.

Returning students to in-person instruction has been a long time coming and we are confident in our ability to provide a safe learning environment for our students and staff. Thank you for your ongoing support during this year of transitions.
