# Active Duty



---

|| Full-Time Military Service ||

Referred to as *Active Duty*.

Each branch has specific jobs but there are more occupations that they have in common. Active-duty service members can pursue a certification or college degree while they serve

Requirements:

- ✓ 18 years old
- ✓ ASVAB
- ✓ Medically Qualified
- ✓ H.S. Diploma/GED





# Reserve

## || part-Time Military Service ||

One-weekend-a-month Military Drill

Two-Weeks-a-year Active Duty\*

Each service also has a Reserve force made up of service members. This allows an individual to pursue school or full-time civilian careers while serving in the military.

The Reserve components combine an individual's civilian experience with military skills. Reserve members can be called to Active Duty to support mission needs

# National Guard

|| part-Time Service ||

One-weekend-a-month Military Drill

Two-Weeks-a-year Active Duty\*

The Army National Guard and Air National Guard are community-based and report to the governor of their respective state unless called to protect U.S. domestic interests in times of conflict or natural disaster. They may also be deployed internationally alongside full-time service members when necessary.

Members of the National Guard hold civilian jobs or attend school while conducting their military training part-time.

# What is the ASVAB?

---

The ASVAB Career Exploration Program (CEP) is a comprehensive, **no cost, no commitment** career planning resource designed to help young people align their strengths and interests with a post-secondary plan that works.

Students in grades 10-12 and first/second year post-secondary are encouraged to participate.

# Scholarships

---

**100% of Tuition**

**\$420/mo stipend**

**\$1,200/year for books**

## **National scholarship**

Full tuition and fees

- Will not pay for flight fees
- Can convert to a cash award

Three deadlines every year.

- I can help regardless of the school
- Interview with a ROTC professor

## **Campus Based scholarship**

Can award 3 to 2 year scholarships

## **Guaranteed Reserve Forces Duty (GRFD) scholarship**

Full tuition scholarships for those currently serving in the National Guard or Army Reserves
