ACTION	PROGRAM	RATIONALE
CONTINUE	More rigorous math curr aligned to CCSS	New learning and high literacies demand changes in math curriculum as do the CCSS.
REFRESH	Programs for closing achievement gap	District data presented in Future Focus session 1 showed achievement gaps for various groups
START	Digital/Online Learning Opportunities	Future demands and characteristics of effective schools show that we need more than one strategy to meet college and career readiness needs.
STOP	Stop providing courses that are not relevant for today's learning	Courses need to be relevant to college and career demands as well as to the learner of today
