

What is the NCAA and NAIA Eligibility Center?







DIVISION I OR II

You need to be certified by the NCAA Eligibility Center to compete at an NCAA Division I or II school.

You need to create a
Certification Account to
make official visits to
Divisions I and II schools
or to sign a National
Letter of Intent. \$100 fee.

DIVISION III OR UNDECIDED

Create a **free** Profile
Page if you plan to
compete at a Division III
school or are not yet sure
where you want to
compete.

NAIA Eligibility Center

PlayNAIA.org is the official clearinghouse for NAIA eligibility. Every student-athlete must register with the NAIA Eligibility Center to play sports at an NAIA college or university. \$100 fee.

GRADE 9: PLAN

- Start planning now! Take the right courses and earn the best grades possible.
- Find your high school's list of NCAA-approved core courses at eligibilitycenter.org/courselist.
- Sign up for a free Profile Page at <u>eligibilitycenter.org</u> for information on NCAA requirements and or register with the NAIA eligibility center at <u>PlayNAIA.org.</u>



GRADE 10 PLAN

- If you fall behind academically, ask your counselor for help finding approved courses you can take.
- Register for a Profile Page or Certification Account with the NCAA Eligibility Center at <u>eligibilitycenter.org</u> and or and or register with the NAIA eligibility center at <u>PlayNAIA.org</u>.
- □ Monitor your Eligibility Center account for next steps.



GRADE 11 PLAN

- Check with your counselor to make sure you are on track to complete the required number of NCAA-approved courses and graduate on time with your class.
- □ Take the ACT or SAT and submit your scores to the NCAA Eligibility
 □ Center using code 9999 or NAIA Eligibility using code 9876.
- ☐ Ensure your sports participation information is correct in your Eligibility Center account.



GRADE 12 PLAN

- ☐ Complete your final NCAA-approved core courses as you prepare for graduation.
- ☐ Take the ACT or SAT again, if necessary, and submit your scores to the NCAA Eligibility Center using code 9999 or NAIA Eligibility using code 9876.
- Request your final amateurism certification in your Certification Account at eligibilitycenter.org
- After you graduate, ask the school registrar to upload your final official transcript with proof of graduation to your NCAA Eligibility Center account.



Standardized Test Score Information

Do I need to submit a standardized test score to the NCAA?

As of January 2023, standardized test scores are <u>not required</u> for all student-athletes who initially enroll full time on or after August 1, 2023. During the 2023 NCAA Convention, **Divisions** I and II adopted legislation to remove standardized test scores for these students.

• However, students should check with the NCAA school they plan to attend regarding whether standardized test scores are necessary for admission or scholarship requirements.

Sports Participation

AMATEURISM

- In general, amateurism requirements do not allow:
 - Contracts with professional teams.
 - Salary for participating in athletics.
 - Prize money above actual and necessary expenses.
 - Play with professionals.
 - Tryouts, practice or competition with a professional team.
 - Benefits from an agent or prospective agent.
 - Agreement to be represented by an agent.
 - Delayed initial full-time collegiate enrollment to participate in organized sports competition.

NIL Deal - Illinois

In 2023, the Illinois High School Association (IHSA) <u>approved</u> a policy that allows high school athletes to earn money for their name, image, and likeness (NIL). However, there are some limitations:

- Athletes can't use the IHSA's name, logos, or trademarks when receiving compensation.
- They can't imply that the IHSA approves of the NIL activity.
- They can't participate in NIL activities during IHSA events.
- The compensation can't exceed \$75. This means that any clothing or meals athletes receive as a benefit of their NIL must cost less than \$75.
